Michigan Green Jobs Report 2009 – Michigan was the second state in the nation to conduct a comprehensive survey of private employers to measure the number of jobs in key green sectors such as Energy Efficiency, Clean Transportation and Fuels, Renewable Energy, Agriculture & Natural Resource Conservation, and Pollution Prevention & Environmental Cleanup. The report uses these survey results and other resources to provide the first complete picture of the key industries and occupations in the Michigan green economy, employment trends among a sample of green-related firms, and the wages, educational requirements, and key skills for select green jobs.

Michigan's Economic and Workforce Indicators – Summer 2009 - This report tracks Michigan labor market trends on a series of indicators related to the workforce, knowledge-based jobs, innovation, education, and the economy. It provides a concise analysis of recent trends in these indicators as well as national or regional comparisons.

Measuring the Global Competitiveness of Michigan's Workforce - Michigan's economic vitality depends in large part on its ability to provide employers with skilled workers. This report examines the competitiveness of Michigan's workforce, based on measures in three categories: human capital, the knowledge economy, and education and skills.

Local Employment Dynamics – An innovative tool that delivers county economic indicators not previously available with demographic detail. Job Creation, Separations, New Hires, Turnover, New Hire Earnings, and more! The system also contains the *OnTheMap* web-based mapping tool showing where people live in relation to where they work with reports on age, earnings, industry distribution, and local workforce indicators.

Michigan Occupational Forecasts 2006-1016 – What detailed occupations in Michigan's economy are expected to record above average job growth? Which occupations will provide above average numbers of annual job openings? What are the educational requirements and wage rates for these jobs? These are questions that can be addressed using the Michigan long-term occupational forecasts.

Business Employment Dynamics – This new program goes beyond traditional data on jobs gained and lost for Michigan and other states, and provides deeper analysis of the components of job change. It measures churning in the labor market, by estimating jobs gained by new firms opening versus expansions at existing business establishments, and jobs lost due to firms closing versus employment contractions at existing businesses.
